Eleven-year-old Anna Paquin became the first New Zealander to win an Academy Award for acting when she was named best supporting actress for her role as Flora McGrath in the acclaimed historical drama, The piano. classical and contemporary choreographies. These performances ranged from dances created over two hundred years ago up to most recently a 2020 piece which depicted ideas about social distancing.

One of our students was even invited on stage to experience a technical dance move.

Te Pihinga will be going to the Hamilton Gardens on Thursday to support learning in many different curriculum areas. In particular, they will be focusing on Kotahitanga/Unity, building relationships and diversity. The children will explore and observe the different gardens and notice what is unique about the cultures they represent.

Action Learning - Photos

In Te Kākano Action Learning is where the children explore, experiment, discover, and solve problems in imaginative and playful ways. Room 12 have been learning about plumbing, colour mixing, making sock puppets and so much more in their short time at school.

One of the great things about Action Learning is that children take time to explore in a positive safe environment, without pressure to perform. Research shows that putting pressure on children to perform can have negative effects on their academic ability. Having high expectations is important but they also need to be realistic.

Those who are familiar with Nathan Wallis will know that children are not ready to learn until they turn seven. Action Learning encourages children to be creative and explore their surroundings to prepare them for more formalised forms of learning. It also encourages children to build positive relationships with their peers and teaches

them to develop the key competencies that help us live and learn.

It's great to see that our littlest learners are off to a great start.

You will see in the term overview that was sent home at the beginning of the year that we have St John's Ambulance visiting next week. Unfortunately the educator has had to resign due to health reasons and we have had to cancel this visit.

Mr Sweetman reports that it has been a successful summer and special thanks to those who volunteered as weekend and holiday custodians to enable us to once again provide this facility over summer.


For those families that have hired out a pool key, please can you return them next week to the office to receive your bond refund.
