This week in New Zealand's Historic past:

15 June 1935 - Lovelock wins Mile of the Century. The Ivy League Princeton University hosted an annual elite mile race during the 1930s. New Zealand medical student Jack Lovelock, who had set a world record there in 1933, was invited to return in 1935 to run in what became known as the 'Mile of the Century'.

16 June 1971 - Polynesian Panther party founded. The Polynesian Panther Party was founded in Auckland by six young Pacific Islanders. The group included Samoans, Tongans, Cook Islanders, and a few Māori. Many were university students. Their headquarters were in Ponsonby, then the heart of the Auckland Pacific Island community.

17 June 1843 - The Wairau incident.

Four Māori and 22 Europeans were killed in the first violent clash between Māori and Pākehā since the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi.

18 June 1932 - Long Distance Walker Esther James reaches Bluff. Aucklander Esther James, a well-connected former model, had left Spirits Bay in the Far North on 3 December to walk the length of the country to promote New Zealand-made goods during the Depression. She had government patronage and support from the Manufacturers' Federation.

19 June 1940 - Niagara mined off northern coast. The Second World War arrived in New Zealand with a bang when German mines sank the trans-Pacific liner *Niagara* off Northland's Bream Head. The sinking shocked the public and shattered any illusions that distance would protect these islands from enemy attack.

20 June 1987 - All blacks win the inaugural Rugby World Cup. With Michael Jones, John

Kirwan and David Kirk scoring tries, the All Blacks defeated France 29–9 at Eden Park, Auckland. Kirk became the first captain to lift the Webb Ellis Cup.

Paid Union Meetings

Gordonton teachers who are members of NZEI Te Riu Roa will be attending a paid union meeting on Tuesday 29th June, with some attending in the morning and others in the afternoon.
